OBITUARY THE REVEREND LOUIS E. FORD

"... for there's a time to laugh and a time to cry
A time to live and a time to Die."

The Reverend Louis E. Ford - son of Lindsay and Hannah Ford of Martinsburg, West Virginia - pastor of Myrtle Baptist Church for thirty-one years - then Pastor Emeritus - slipped quietly away at the Framingham Union Hospital - Sunday morning - March 2nd.

Seeth than a man diligent in his business He shall stand before Kings!! He shall not stand before Men!!

The above quote is a reminder of an article written by Elizabeth Prince - reporter for the Boston Transcript - October 1938 - entitled, "Newton Baptist Pastor Fashions Brooms in Cellar Workshop Between Sermons."

The Reverend Louis E. Ford - pastor of the Myrtle Baptist Church of West Newton, is known as "the broom parson" - for he carries on as an avocation the trade by which his grandfather, Abraham Ford - also a minister was able to buy himself out of slavery . . . Mr. Ford, like his grandfather began his broom making in the South and had established a prosperous factory in Baltimore. He was a student at Morgan State College when he received a scholarship to study for the ministry at Boston University. He came to New England in 1921.

While a student at Boston University School of Theology, he was pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church in Haverhill and the Third Baptist Church of Lawrence. In 1933, he accepted a call to Myrtle Baptist Church of Newton - where now he takes his leave.

He was married to the late Madonia Dorsey Ford in 1934 and together they made a team in the broom manufacturing business - first in Newton, then later and lastly in Natick. A letter from the S.S. Pierce Company attests to the excellence of the team.

Dear Rev. Ford:
